

## U-M Students Install Mural in Detroit

A gray stretch of a Detroit neighborhood is a little bit brighter now, thanks to the work of 24 U-M students in the Lloyd Hall Scholars Program. The students installed a 12- by 40-foot mural on the side of Detroit's 4731 Gallery in April. Created using surreal collage techniques, the colorful mural is centered on the theme of "Home." The group also created a documentary film of the experience.

LHSP art instructor Mark Tucker, MFA'85, spearheaded the effort by working with Richard Geyer, a Detroit executive and ambassador for Michigan Governor Jennifer Granholm's Cool Cities Initiative, to secure the venue. "It's a pretty transitional neighborhood in Detroit, so it seemed like a good place for it," says Tucker.
